

Phonological Awareness: Segmenting Words

Description

Children say a word and then say the individual sounds separately but in sequence.

You Need

- Phonological Awareness Assessment-Individual Record form
- Phonological Awareness Assessment-Class Record form

Why Use It

This assessment helps you learn whether children can take a word and segment it into individual sounds. This ability helps children in both spelling and decoding. Some children may understand this principle with only a few demonstrations. Others will need more experience.

How to Use It

Administer this assessment individually so you can closely observe behaviour. Say the word and ask the child to say the segmented sounds in the word: "I am going to say a word. Then you say the sounds in the word, like this: fan, /f/-/ă/-/n/." Then continue with:

wet [/w/-/ĕ/-/t/]

vase [/v/-/ā/-/s/]

trip [/t/-/r/-/ĭ/-/p/]

miss [/m/-/ĭ/-/s/]

duck [/d/-/ŭ/-/k/]

pad [/p/-/ă/-/d/]

fast /f/-/ā/-/s/-/t/]

kick [/k/-/ĭ/-/k/]

tool [/t/-/oo/-/l/]

boat [/b/-/ō/-/t/]

Record results on the child's Individual Record. Consider the task mastered if a child can segment eight of the ten words.

- What to Notice Ability to listen to and understand the task
 - Ability to say each sound
 - ► Ability to say sounds in sequence
